


# **Using Your Medicare Card**



Your Medicare card has a unique number just for you. It is not your Social Security Number. This helps keep your identity safe.

#### What's on your Medicare card?

Your card includes:

- Whether you have Medicare Part A (Hospital), Medicare Part B (Medical), or both.
- The date your coverage begins.

#### How do you get your Medicare card?

Once you sign up for Medicare, you will receive your card in a <u>welcome packet</u>. If you did not receive your Medicare card by mail, you can print your official card by visiting <u>Medicare.gov</u> and creating a secure Medicare account.

If you receive benefits from the **Railroad Retirement Board (RRB)** and have not received your card by mail, visit <u>RRB.gov</u> for more information.

#### Keep your Medicare number safe

Treat your Medicare number like a credit card number. Only share it with:

- Doctors and healthcare providers.
- · Your insurance company or Medicare health plan.
- Trusted people who help with Medicare, such as the State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP).

#### Beware of scams

Never share your Medicare number or personal information with anyone who contacts you unexpectedly—whether by phone, email, or in person.

- If someone asks for your Medicare number, requests money, or threatens to cancel your benefits, **hang up** immediately and **call Medicare at 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227). TTY users can call 1-877-486-2048.**
- Medicare will never call you to request personal information unless you initiated the contact.

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#### Carrying your Medicare card

You need your Medicare card to:

- Join a Medicare Advantage plan (Part C) or drug (part D) plan.
- Buy a Medicare Supplement Insurance (Medigap) plan.

#### If you have Original Medicare:

- · Carry your Medicare card when you travel.
- Show your card when visiting a doctor, hospital, or other healthcare provider.
- If you have a separate drug plan or supplemental insurance, carry those cards too.

### If you have a Medicare Advantage Plan:

- Use your plan's card for healthcare services instead of your Medicare card.
- Keep your Medicare card in a safe place in case you switch plans or return to Original Medicare later.

### How to get a new Medicare card

If your Medicare card is **lost or damaged**, visit <u>Medicare.gov</u> and log into or create a secure Medicare account to print or order a new one. You can also call **1-800-MEDICARE** (**1-800-633-4227**). **TTY users can call 1-877-486-2048**.

If you receive benefits from the **Railroad Retirement Board (RRB)**, call **1-877-772-5772** for a replacement card. **TTY users can call 1-312-751-4701**.

If your **name has changed**, your Medicare card will show the name on file with **Social Security**. Contact Social Security for updates.

## **Protect Your Identity**

If you think someone is using your Medicare number, call Medicare at 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227).

If you believe you were a victim of identity theft or mistakenly shared personal information, contact the <u>Federal Trade Commission (FTC)</u>.
